Training

For our fall season courses we are happy to be able to put on the following:

Boating Basics (PCOC) Starting September 9 2014. All operators of motorized pleasure craft are required proof of operator competency. All you need to know for the Transport Canada test is presented in an easy to read format that is both informative and entertaining. You can be confident that this study guide meets all the standards established by Transport Canada's Office of Boating

As an extra benefit, if you pass the test offered by Canadian Power and

Sail Squadrons, your Card is recognized by BOTH Transport Canada and The National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (USA). You may contact Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons to locate a testing facility in your area.

Starting September 9 2014

Boating Essentials starting September 30 2014. This course continues where Boating Basics left off and offers instruction in Navigation, Charting, Plotting and an introduction to Electronic Navigation. PCOC will get you on the water; Boating Essentials will get you safely home.

global positioning and charts, navigation, conning, plotting, digital charts, anchoring, lines and ropes, electrical hazards, towing, boating and the environment and more.

Prerequisites: PCOC (Boating Basics)

Marine Maintenance starting September 16 2014. The full enjoyment of boating includes both the pleasure of using the boat and the satisfaction of properly maintaining it. To many boaters, working on their boat is part of the fun, to say nothing of the savings in costs.

All boats need maintenance to correct for the gradual deterioration from wear and tear let alone exposure to the elements. A boater should be constantly on the alert for signs of vessel degradation, and make repairs while the problem is minor.

Drink Recipes

I always try a new drink in the summer and this year I found a Watermelon and Cucumber Mojito.

Take a few cubes of watermelon, 3 slices of English cucumber, a couple of fresh mint leaves, one tablespoon of sugar, a good squeeze of lime juice and muddle them together. This will take a couple of minutes but is worth the fuss. Add an ounce of white rum. Strain into a tall glass, half filled with ice and top with ginger ale. Add a couple watermelon chunks and a slice of cucumber if you wish. This drink has a very nice flavor and is very forgiving if the recipe is not followed perfectly.

I have always liked Tequila and have traditionally done a tequila shot followed by salt and lime. While on vacation in Delray Beach Florida my husband found a great Mexican Restaurant with over 100 types of tequila. I ordered a flight with 4 different types of tequila, but instead of salt and lime, it was accompanied with a shot glass of a very spicy Bloody Mary. I make it at home with tomato juice, horseradish and tabasco sauce. Somehow, the hotter I make it, the better the tequila tastes!

Anchors aweigh! - Or maybe not? Fireworks, July 26th

I have always taken my boat down to the Vancouver fireworks. Maribel and I host a dinner cruise with our family, friends from CPS and work. We have always anchored in False creek on Fri night and everyone shows up for dinner on the boat before heading out to anchor with all the other boats.

This time my anchor was caught on something while anchored in False creek. I use a 65 pound anchor with 400 feet of 3/8 chain. With a boat load of people I tried in vain to lift the anchor, pulling up using the windless, turning the boat and using the boats height to pull and push and lift. It was no use, that anchor is not coming up. With John Hubbard and Ed Bolli on the bow trying to catch the cable or what ever the anchor was caught on with a grappling hook attached to a 30 foot dock line.

Again, this didn't work ether. Back and forth, round and round,up and down, they couldn't hook what we're caught on with the grappling hook. So I made the decision to go diving. Lucky for us, I keep my Scuba gear on board.

So I got suited up and down the chain I went. Getting to the bottom (24 feet) I felt around the chain and it went straight in the mud. With no visibility a light didn't help at all. I felt around the mud again, pulling up on the chain. No anchor?

It was so deep in the mud and caught on something that wasn't on the surface of the bottom, there wasn't any chance of the guys on deck to hook anything. So now with 0 visibility I started to dig into the muddy bottom. Down about a foot I found the anchor shaft but could not get to flukes, but did feel some junk, cables some kind of heavy screen, wires etc..

Now what to do? I can't get to other end of my anchor to attach a trip line to it. So I came back up and got the Grappling hook and dove again. Placing the hook as low on the anchor shaft as I could and put the mud back on to of it so that it couldn't come off.

I resurfaced and asked Ed to relay to John who is now at the helm to back the boat up while lowering the boats chain. Once he was back far enough so the chain was laid out along the bottom we had the line attached to the grappling hook tied to the back of my sisters boat. I gave the hand signal for her boat to pull away.

The anchor pulled out backwards and we are free. Now that's the first time I have ever had trouble to retrieve my anchor in all the years I've been boating. Now I think I'll attach a trip line and float to it and save a lot of grief and time.
